

# Norwich Research Park



- The John Innes Centre was the first unit in the Research Park and was built in 1910, though the biggest development in the park was in the 1960s.
  - The UEA is part of the park and is a source of graduate employees for the centres.
  - It has good transport connections with the A47 and A11 and frequent buses link it to the train station and airport.
  - The park also has meeting spaces, several cafes, high-speed broadband and a nursery all on site.
- Set in over 230 hectares of attractive parkland, Norwich Research Park is a thriving community of over 80 businesses, 3,000 scientists, researchers and clinicians.
  - Norwich Research Park specialises in biotechnology and biological research and includes the John Innes Centre, the Institute of Food Research and the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital among others.
  - In 2011 the park received £26m from the government to stimulate new businesses and create 5000 new jobs.
  - By 2030 Norwich Research Park aims to be the leading international science park conducting research in food, health and environmental sciences.

# Broadland Business Park



- In 2018, Lovewell Blake (accountants and business planners) welcomed a new intake of 13 apprentices and graduate trainees.
- The Park offers a wide range of amenities; conference rooms, the Waterside Café, a Premier Inn hotel, a pub/restaurant and a drive-thru Costa. On site there is also a Bannatyne's Health Club, a Busy Bees childrens' nursery and a Sainsbury's supermarket.
- Broadland Business Park is home to many of the region's top companies, including Aviva, Lovewell Blake, Computer Service Centre, NHS Norfolk, BT, Yodel, and Makro.
- The site is set to grow; with the construction of the NDR a new 45-acre expansion is planned.
- Computer Service Centre manages 450 servers and deals with 200K calls each year. They are also involved with the development of off-shore windfarms creating renewable energy for 220,000 homes per year.
- The park is on the edge of the Norfolk Broads and the River Yare. Wildlife such as moorhens, foxes, herons and otters are common to see in the landscaped areas. There is also a memorial garden home to a Polish War Memorial.
